We provide the largest and best maintained fleet on the North Slope with more than 2,000 pieces of equipment including a multitude of cranes ranging from five to 30 tons, forklifts, light plants, generators, vacuum trucks and other heavy construction equipment. With our locations in Anchorage, Kenai and Deadhorse, we have more than 125 acres of pad space, more than 80,000 square feet of shop space, and capability to produce more than 10,000 tons per year of truckable modules up to 120 tons and 40,000 tons per year of sealift modules with our largest being greater than 3,700 tons. With more than 1,000 truckable and sealift modules fabricated, CH2M HILL is a leader in design-build modules for the arctic environment.

*Q. What are your Fabrication and Construction capabilities?*

A. Our engineers pioneered the idea that major truckable and sealift module construction undertaken in Alaska can compete in cost and quality with traditional modules constructed far from Alaska's oil fields. In 2001, we successfully completed the largest modules ever to be constructed in the State of Alaska for BPXA's Northstar field development project in the Beaufort Sea. The modules were built at the Port of Anchorage, ushering in a new era of major module construction within the state. To date, we have constructed more than 500 drillsite truckable modules for the North Slope including production manifolds, test separators, metering units, launchers, receivers, generators, and electrical & instrumentation modules.

We also perform much of the construction and installation of process and non-process facilities on the North Slope. In fact, we just completed the largest installation contract tendered in Alaska in more than 10 years. With both onshore and offshore components, the performance-based contract for more than 25 modules and pipe rack assemblies were completed on schedule during the winter in one of the world's harshest work environments.

**Q.** What do you most want people to know about your company?

A. In 2011, Crowley made a formal foray into project management expanding its already robust portfolio of services with the addition of the company's solutions group. While the company has long supported the needs of Alaskans and the petroleum business within the state, this new business group solidifies the company's commitment to providing complete turnkey project solutions.

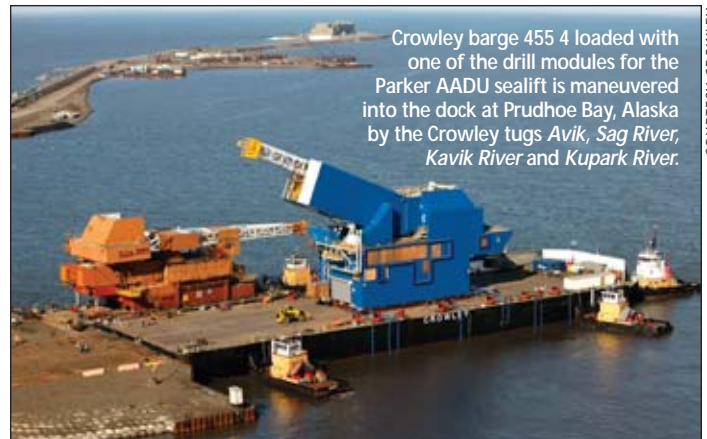
**Q.** Where is your company located?

A. Crowley has many locations throughout the world. Its corporate headquarters is in Jacksonville, Florida. Its new solutions group is headquartered in Houston, Texas and its Alaska headquarters is located in Anchorage providing a hub for the 23 offices the company maintains across the state.



**Q.** What year was the company founded and by whom?

A. Crowley was founded in 1892, by Thomas Crowley — the grandfather of current chairman, president and CEO Thomas B. Crowley, Jr. The company entered the Alaska market in 1953, providing marine, petroleum distribution and energy support services throughout Alaska, from the North Slope to Southcentral Alaska, along the coast and into some of the most remote inland areas including communities along the Kuskokwim and Yukon Rivers.

**Q.** Are there important projects the company is currently a part of or has done recently?

A. With the addition of a formal project management organization, Crowley has cemented its commitment to getting the toughest jobs done safely and efficiently despite the most challenging environments. Most recently, these include the Parker Arctic Alaskan Drilling Units (AADU) and BP's Northstar Operations Center.

## Parker AADU Sealift

The Parker AADU sealift, required moving two Arctic Alaskan Drilling Units collectively weighing more than 10,000 tons, from Vancouver, Wash., to Prudhoe Bay. Crowley's solutions team orchestrated the loading of both modules onto the company's heavy-strength deck barge, 455 5, for tow from the Columbia River to the North Slope by the high-torque Crowley tugboat *Guardman*. Upon arrival in Prudhoe Bay, the 455 5 was secured and grounded offshore in 13 feet of water to remove the possibility of unsafe dynamic elements. Sister vessel 455 4, towed to Prudhoe by the tug *Hunter*, was then brought in and grounded end-to-end with the 455 5. Offering a second stable platform, each of the six self-propelled modules were hauled one at a time onto the 455 4. With a single, lighter load, this sister barge had a lesser draft and was pushed through the shallows by four of Crowley's shallow draft tugs. Precise timing with the tides allowed the deballasted, refloated 455 4 to squeak through the shallows of less than five-and-a-half feet of water. This was repeated safely five more times.

## BP Northstar Operations Center Project Cargo

Before departure, the company's 455-series barges, which are 105 feet wide even without the oversized cargo loaded on-board, had to be modified and outfitted to transit through the

**Q.** What is the company's primary business sector?

A. Crowley Maritime Corporation is a U.S.-owned and operated marine solutions, transportation and logistics company providing services in domestic and international markets through six operating lines of business: Puerto Rico/Caribbean liner services, Latin America liner services, logistics, marine contract solutions, deep sea petroleum transportation, and petroleum transportation, distribution and sales in Alaska.

Panama Canal, whose maximum allowable width of a vessel is 106 feet. Once cleared through the canal, Crowley tug *Warrior* led the 455 3 northward to Alaska, arriving almost a week ahead of schedule. Because Northstar Island is an exposed, deep-water island off the North Slope, the barge couldn't be grounded, and instead required a live, or floating, discharge. Solutions arranged for Crowley's shallow-draft river tugs to position the barge and cargo just offshore as the *Warrior* pushed alongside it to provide continual counter-force against the currents to hold it in place. In addition to drafting a mooring plan that called for the 455 3 to be secured to the dry land of the island with high-strength lines and cables, engineers remained on site to monitor the waves, tides and winds, and adjust the ballast as needed.

*Q. Describe the equipment your company might use and are there any new purchases planned?*

A. Crowley maintains a fleet of 200 vessels, consisting of RO/RO (roll-on-roll-off) vessels, LO/LO (lift-on-lift-off) vessels, tankers, tugs and barges. Land-based facilities and equipment include terminals, warehouses, tank farms, office buildings, trucks, trailers, containers, chassis, cranes and other specialized vehicles.



Under construction are the company's new Ocean Class tugboats, the first of which was launched in December of 2011. The *Ocean Wave* and *Ocean Wind* are classed as Dynamic Positioning 1 (DP1) tugboats and are twin-screw, steel-hulled tugs with an overall length of 146 ft, beam of 46 ft, hull depth of 25 ft and design draft of 21 ft. The second two tugs of the class, *Ocean Sky* and *Ocean Sun*, will be classed as DP2 and will be 10 feet longer.

The new tugs will be ideally suited to work with Crowley's new 455-series heavy lift deck barges, which measure 400 feet by 105 feet and offer increased stability for loads up to 4,200 pounds per square foot. The tugs will be outfitted for, and capable of, rig moves, platform and Floating Production, Storage and Offloading (FPSO) unit tows, emergency response and firefighting, and will have the capability to support salvage and rescue towing opportunities.

*Q. Is your company expanding any of its operations or locations or changing any of its services?*

A. In 2011, the company expanded its portfolio of services by adding the solutions group to professionally manage large scale projects. The company also acquired Jarvis International Freight, Inc., a Houston-based freight forwarding, export packing and logistics company primarily serving the energy, oilfield and mining industries. Jarvis offers regular shipments by sea to noted

international oilfield centers such as Aberdeen, Stavanger, Rotterdam, Abu Dhabi, Dubai and Singapore and is also a customs broker with bonded warehouse capabilities.

*Q. What are the biggest obstacles to completing work the company undertakes?*

A. The remote nature of the majority of Alaska and the villages and projects that Crowley supports is an obstacle. When combined with the weather challenges found in Alaska it really is true that people are tougher in Alaska. The services Crowley provides to local communities are a vital part of life in the last frontier.

*Q. What do you see as your company's biggest challenge in the next five years?*

A. The changing ice conditions will open new resource opportunities in the Arctic and present new challenges. The marine shipping season could potentially be extended and new equipment is being designed and constructed to meet that challenge. New infrastructure and services will need to be developed to support this increased activity. Crowley is already preparing for these opportunities.

*Q. What steps does the company take to ensure a safe work environment?*

A. Safety is Crowley's number one core value. The company documents Safety Moments before meetings or shift changes, including near-miss and corrective action reporting, mandates the use of personal protection equipment, demands strict adherence to all operating guidelines and regulations, and provides extensive employee training.

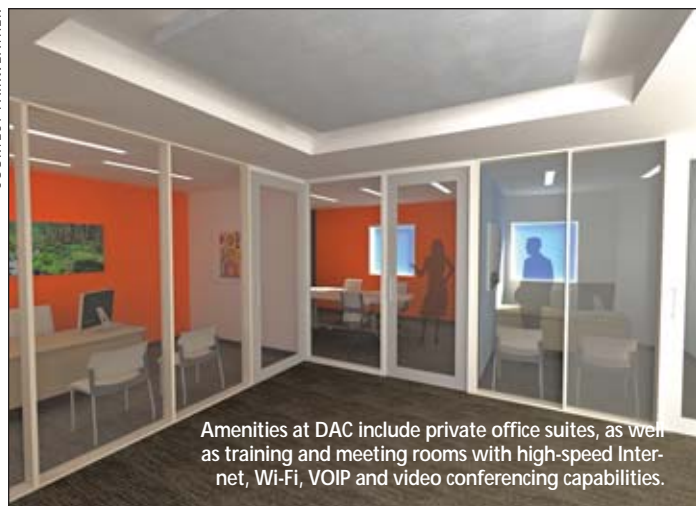

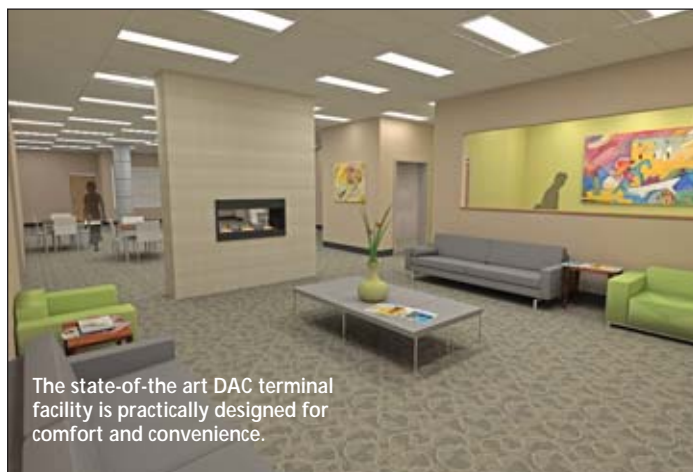

# Four new units for BRPC

*State divides 2 unit proposals into 4 with drilling commitments through 2014*

Over the past year, Brooks Range Petroleum Corp. applied to form two units in the central North Slope fairway between the Colville River and Kuparuk River units.

Instead, it got four, with much less total acreage.

In separate decisions in late October, the Alaska Department of Natural Resources divided the proposed Putu unit into the smaller Tofkat and Putu units, and the proposed Southern Miluveach unit into the smaller Southern Miluveach and Kachemach units.

With the decisions, BRPC must now drill as many as 11 wells and sidetracks, and decide whether to sanction two development projects at the four units by mid-2014.

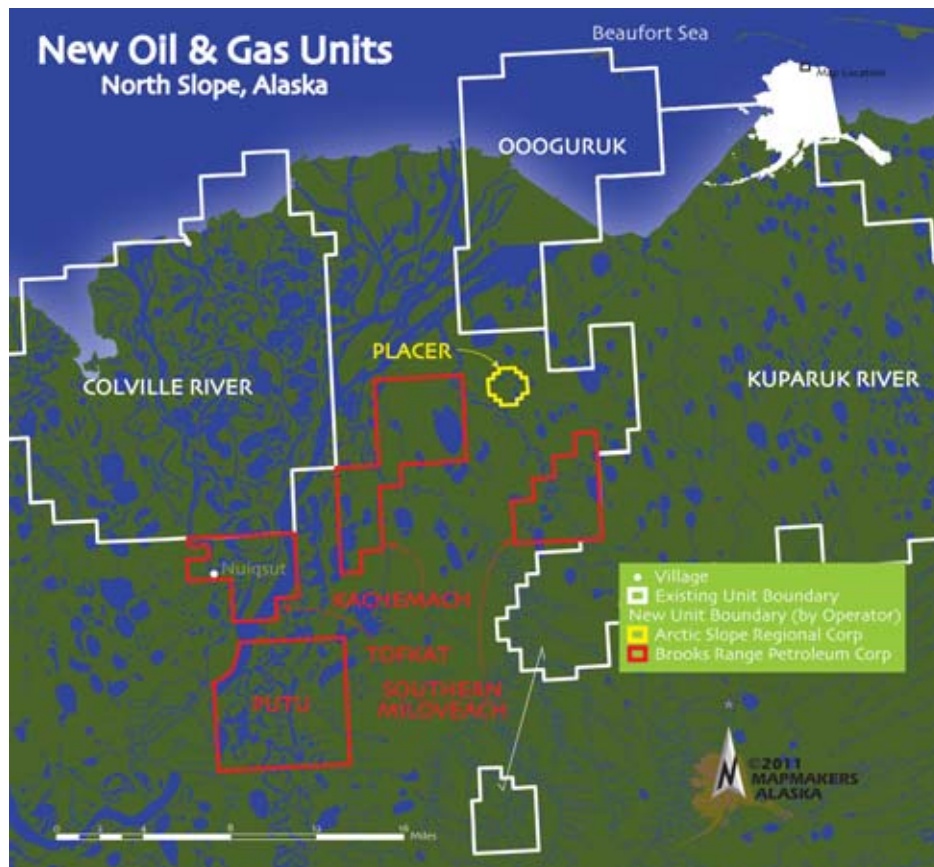
BRPC is the local operating arm of Kansas-based independent Alaska Venture Capital Group LLC and the operator of a multi-company joint venture that includes Brooks Range Development Corp. (the local development affiliate of BRPC), the Calgary-based independent TG World Energy Inc. and Nabors subsidiary Ramshorn Investments Inc.

## The Tofkat and Putu units

BRPC applied to form the Putu unit in March 2011, but DNR didn't deem the application complete until July. The original proposal covered some 39,993 acres over 39 leases, including 28 owned jointly by the state and Arctic Slope Regional Corp., along the eastern edge of the Colville River, south of the Colville River unit, near Nuiqsut.

The original Putu unit proposed three exploration blocks — North, Southwest and Southeast — but DNR ultimately broke those into two units. The North block is now the Tofkat unit, while the Southwest and Southeast blocks are now the Putu unit to take advantage of the differing geologies and exploration histories within the region.

The Tofkat unit includes 21 leases owned jointly by the state and ASRC covering some 9,131 acres, while the Putu unit includes nine state leases covering some



21,946 acres.

The nine leases not included in either unit will expire at the end of their terms, unless unitized at some point in the future (although two leases expired on March 31, 2011).

DNR also increased the rental rates on numerous leases to make up for the potentially lost revenue it could collect by leasing that acreage out to another company.

Once the 15 leases in the Tofkat unit set to expire between July 31, 2012, and Aug. 31, 2013, reach the end of the primary terms, the rental rates will jump to \$4.50 per acre, up from \$3 per acre, as will the nine leases in the Putu unit set to expire Aug. 31, 2012.

The working interest owners must also execute a new agreement with ASRC.

## Tofkat geology known

The Tofkat unit includes three wells BRPC drilled in the area in early 2008.

BRPC drilled the Tofkat No. 1 well and

the Tofkat No. 1-A and Tofkat No. 1-B sidetracks in the N Block in 2008, and in later 2008 acquired proprietary seismic over the area.

The primary target of those wells was "Kuparuk C sands, Brookian Albian-age turbidite fans and Jurassic-age Alpine sands," three geologic intervals with oil producing reservoirs in the Colville River unit some six miles north of the Tofkat unit.

After reviewing geologic and geophysical information in the application, DNR determined that "a portion of the N block does encompass an oil reservoir within the C member of the Kuparuk Formation, and two reasonably defined and delineated potential hydrocarbon accumulations in the shallower Nanushuk and Torok formations."

Because the wells drilled in early 2008 penetrated and evaluated both the reservoir and the two potential accumulations, the Tofkat unit is more defined than the new Putu unit.

Under the plan of exploration for the Tofkat unit, BRPC must drill and complete the Tofkat No. 2 well and Tofkat No. 2-A sidetrack into the Kuparuk formation by May 31, 2013. The working interest owners must sanction the Tofkat development project by Oct. 1, 2013 — and keep it sanctioned through production — or terminate the unit.

### Putu needs more drilling

Although not home to any previous exploration drilling, the new Putu unit sits mostly within a 220-square mile 3-D seismic package that BRPC acquired in 2008 and used to identify “prospective targets they believe have a higher probability of encountering reservoir quality sand” than the four previous wells drilled within two miles of the unit.

Those wells, drilled between 1972 and 2006, all encountered hydrocarbon-bearing zones in the Brookian Torok formation, “but so far these strata have lacked sufficient reservoir quality to likely produce or warrant development by the operators,” DNR noted in its decision, adding, “encountering reservoir quality strata with sufficient connectivity has historically been the crux to unlocking the Brookian potential on the North Slope.”

ARCO drilled the Itkillik River Unit No. 1 to 15,321 feet in 1972, attempting nine drill stem production tests and taking three conventional core samples from the well. The deepest of those tests — at an interval in the Kekiktuk formation between 14,510 and 14,726 feet — flowed at an estimated rate of 3,500 cubic feet per day over six hours.

Phillips Alaska drilled the Atlas No. 1 well and Atlas No. 1-A sidetrack to 7,335 and 8,454 feet respectively in 2001, finding hydrocarbon-bearing zones in the Torok Formation but not gathering fluid samples or conducting production tests at either well.

Pioneer Natural Resources Alaska drilled the Cronus No. 1 well to 7,941 feet in 2006 to explore a Brookian sourced target in the Torok formation similar to the Atlas wells.

Cronus No. 1 encountered two zones in the Torok formation that appeared to be hydrocarbon bearing, but Pioneer ultimately decided they were too tight to produce.

Under the agreement for the new Putu unit, BRPC must post a \$10 million performance bond by Feb. 1, 2012, to guarantee that it will commit to a four-well drilling program.

The first payment of \$1 million is due on May 31, 2012.

The company must then drill four wells into the Upper Jurassic-age strata of the Kingak formation by May 31, 2013, two targeting the Musketeer trend (Brookian Sequence Boundary C) and two targeting the Big Foot trend (Brookian Sequence Boundary BC).

### S Miluveach and Kachemach

BRPC applied to form the Southern Miluveach unit in December 2010 and DNR deemed the application complete in late June after the company submitted two revisions.

The original proposal covered some 60,864 acres over 40 leases, including 11 owned jointly by the state and ASRC, a mile to the northeast of the new Tofkat and Putu units.

The initial application proposed six exploration blocks: Northeast, Southeast, Northwest, Southwest, West and South. The state ultimately created the Southern Miluveach unit out of the Southeast block and the Kachemach unit out of the West and Northwest

blocks.

The Southern Miluveach unit now includes five state leases covering some 8,960 acres, while the Kachemach unit includes 11 state/ASRC leases covering some 16,487 acres.

The leases not included in either unit will expire at the end of their terms.

DNR also increased the rental rates on 18 leases in the Kachemach unit and five leases in the Southern Miluveach unit to \$4.50 per acre from \$3 per acre to make up for the lost revenue it might have collected by leasing the acreage out to another company.

### Oil shows in the Torok

The first wells drilled in the area — the Colville No. 1 in 1966 and the Kookpuk No. 1 in 1967 — targeted Lisburne formation, but considered it unsuccessful after an evaluation.

The Kuparuk River unit to the east produces from the Lower Cretaceous-age Kuparuk River formation at the Kuparuk PA and the shallower Upper-Cretaceous Bermuda sands of the Seabee formation at the Tarn PA. The Colville River unit to the west produces from the Jurassic-age Alpine and Nechelik sands in the Kingak formation, from the Lower Cretaceous-age Kuparuk C sand and from Upper Cretaceous-age Nanuq sands in the Torok formation and shallower Qannik sands of the Nanushuk formation.

ARCO drilled the Colville River No. 1 well to 7,300 feet in 1993. Although the original objective in the Cretaceous-age sands of the Kuparuk formation proved to be unsuccessful, the company did encounter “weak oil shows” in the Torok formation.

ConocoPhillips drilled the KRU-2L-03 well as an exploration step out from the Tarn 2L drill site in 2002, reaching a bottom hole location in the southeast corner of the Southern Miluveach unit at 11,316 feet to target Kuparuk C sand, but later gave up the lease.

ConocoPhillips drilled the Oberon No. 1 well eight miles west of KRU-2L-03 in 2003 to 7,580 feet targeting the Kuparuk C sand and the Alpine sands in the Kingak formation.

BRPC participated in the Ataruq No. 2 and Ataruq No. 2A well and sidetrack that Kerr McGee drilled in the proposed unit area in 2005 to 7,400 feet and 11,242 feet respectively to target Cretaceous-age Brookian submarine fans and the deeper Lower Cretaceous Kuparuk formation before reaching a total depth in the Miluveach formation, encountering oil shows in the Brookian formation but not in the Kuparuk formation.

The 2008 seismic survey covered the western half of the original Southern Miluveach unit and this year BRPC acquired a license for an earlier survey covering the eastern half, identifying potential stratigraphic traps in both the Brookian and Kuparuk formations.

BRPC drilled North Tarn No. 1 in early 2011 to 6,223 feet, identifying an oil reservoir in the Kuparuk C sand in the SE Block. BRPC also believes there could be a potential accumulation in the Nanushuk formation in the W and NW Blocks. The Nanushuk produces oil at the Qannik sands of the Colville River unit 11 miles west of the unit.

### Six wells in the two units

Under the agreement for the new Southern Miluveach unit, BRPC must complete three wells — the North Tarn No. 1-A well, the Mustang No. 1 well and the Mustang No. 2 well or sidetrack — into the Kuparuk formation by May 31, 2012, and the working interest owners must sanction the Mustang development project by Oct. 1,

# Placer unit on North Slope wins approval

*ASRC Exploration commits to drill new exploratory well or test existing well by mid-2013; unit area contains known oil reservoir*

Alaska's oil and gas director has approved formation of the Placer unit on the North Slope.

Bill Barron, director of the state Division of Oil and Gas, signed the approval on Sept. 9, wrapping up a nearly eight-month application process for the unit.

The sole working interest owner in the Placer unit is ASRC Exploration LLC, a subsidiary of the Arctic Slope Regional Corp.

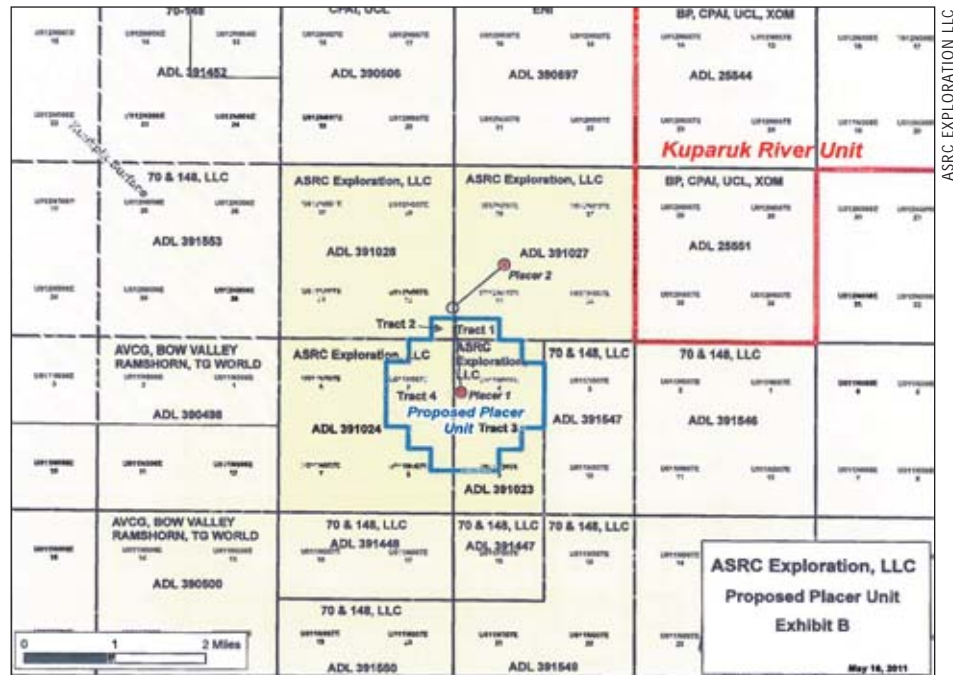
The unit approval includes an exploration commitment on the part of ASRC Exploration, and describes a number of oil developments in Placer's neighborhood.

Barron found that the application met all the state's unit criteria. Unitization binds together a group of leases, which often have multiple owners, to encourage orderly and thorough exploration and production with minimal waste of dollars or resources.

In exchange for a unit designation, the state typically expects a significant work commitment from the company acting as unit operator.

ASRC, based in Barrow, is one of the regional Native corporations formed under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act of 1971. The company has vast land holdings across the top of the state, and represents about 11,000 Inupiat shareholders.

ASRC long has been involved in Alaska oil field services, and recently has shown



interest in the exploration and production sector.

The Placer unit ties together parts of four state oil and gas leases southwest of the ConocoPhillips-operated Kuparuk River unit, one of the nation's biggest oil fields. The unit covers a total of 1,480 acres.

Unitization carries the benefit of extending the life of the leases, which otherwise were set to expire on Jan. 31, 2012.

The state can bid out expired acreage again and collect sale proceeds. To offset the loss of this revenue, the state is increasing the rental rate for the four Placer leases from \$3 per acre to \$4.50.

Unitization will give ASRC Exploration time to determine whether the reservoir within Placer can be commercially developed, Barron's decision says.

As part of its unit application, ASRC Exploration submitted confidential and public information demonstrating that the unit includes all or part of an oil reservoir, the unit decision says. The submitted material included geologic cross sections; analyses of well log, core and fluid data; and regional structure maps. No interpreted seismic data was provided.

The primary reservoir in the Placer unit

2012.

The Kachemach unit is now divided into two exploration blocks, Block A and Block B.

Under the Kachemach unit agreement, BRPC must complete one well in Block A targeting the Caribou trend (Brookian Sequence Boundary F) and one well in Block A targeting the Moonlight trend (TP4-2 Nanushuk prospect) by May 31, 2013.

If BRPC meets those commitments the company must then

commit to complete one well in Block B targeting the Moonlight trend (TP4-1 Nanushuk prospect) by May 31, 2014.

The two decisions make BRPC the operator of five units on the North Slope.

In addition to the four new units, DNR approved the formation of the 52,876-acre Beechey Point unit in the Gwydyr Bay region north of Prudhoe Bay in September 2009.

Earlier this year, BRPC also applied to form the Greater Bullen unit in the area between the Point Thomson and Badami units on the eastern North Slope, but recently withdrew that application and announced plans to apply for a smaller unit in the area next year.

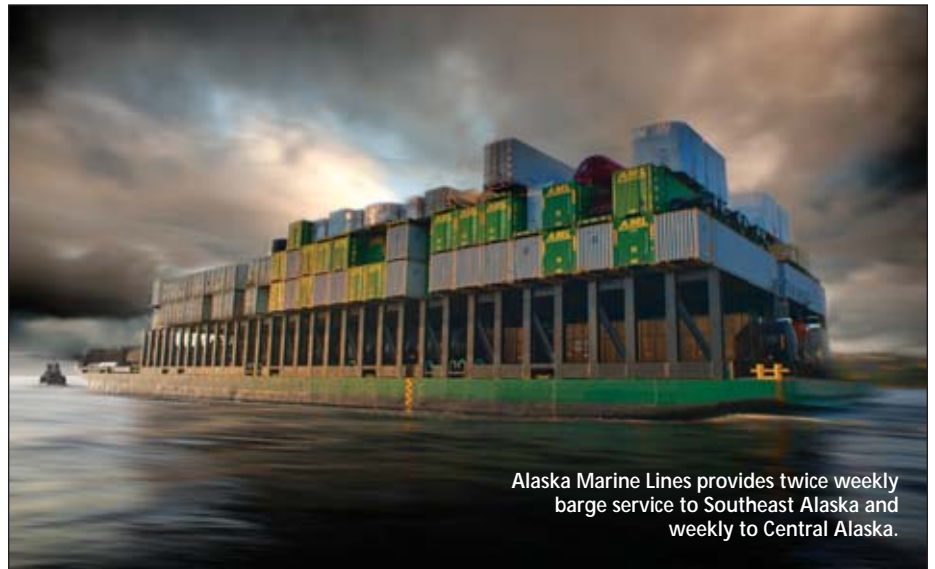


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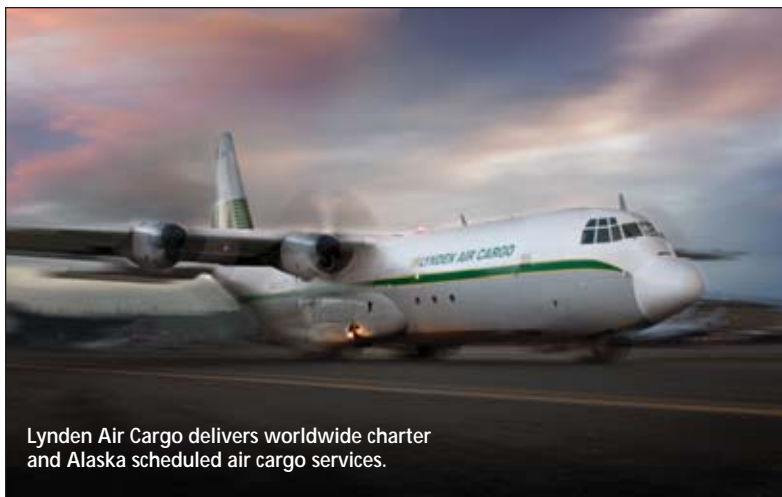

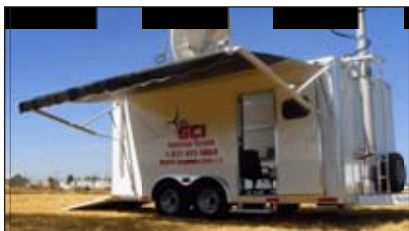

## Global ROV to be used to determine oil at 900 feet

Global Diving and Salvage Inc. said Oct. 10 that it has been contracted by the United States Coast Guard to determine if oil is present aboard the sunken ship S.S. Montebello, which sits 900 feet below the ocean surface approximately 6.5 miles off the coast of Cambria, Calif.

The S.S. Montebello sank after a Japanese submarine torpedoed the large oil tanker on Dec. 23, 1941. To date, no signs of leakage have been detected, and from previous visual inspections by submarine, the cargo section appears to be intact.

The possibility of future oil release has prompted the U.S. Coast Guard to contract Global to determine the integrity of the cargo section and its contents.

Global's Cougar XT ROV will be used as the platform which will support the inspection, both visual and sonar, thickness gauging, backscatter tooling operations, physical sampling of the tank contents, and sediment sampling from the general area. Global has teamed with T & T Bisso to provide engineering support and 3-D modeling on the vessel. Additionally, Tracerco has been subcontracted to utilize their neutron backscatter tool, a non-invasive sensing device, which will be used to determine the presence of oil and oil/water interface.

The average ASRC shareholder owns 100 shares of ASRC stock and will receive \$3,431. This dividend brings the total dollars distributed since incorporation, in the form of dividends, to approximately \$542.5 million.

"During these uncertain economic times, we recognize how important these dividends are to our shareholders," said Jacob Adams Sr., ASRC board chairman. "As we near our 40th anniversary, it's gratifying to see the difference the corporation and its employees have made to our North Slope communities."

The ASRC board of directors typically authorizes two dividend distributions, one in the fall based on preliminary year-end financial performance estimates with a typical "true-up" dividend in the spring, based on final financial results.

## Era Alaska pilot helps locate missing North Slope man

Era Alaska said one of its pilots, Eric Greener, flying a Caravan out of Barrow en route to Atkasuk on Oct. 18, heard a faint radio signal transmission. The signal, weak and garbled, prompted Greener to call back to acquire a stronger signal.

At the same time, in another part of the area, the North Slope Borough Rescue Service was actively searching for a man who had been out of contact for more than three days.

While on the radio, Greener discovered the man he was communicating with on the ground was the very person being searched for by the NSBRS. He continued talking with him and by activating his airplane lights and maintaining contact, was able to locate him.

Greener then contacted borough officials, and provided accurate coordinates to assist them in locating the missing man.

After being picked up by helicopter, the man was then transported to the Barrow hospital, where officials say he was rescued in the nick of time.

## PLACER UNIT

is the Kuparuk C sandstone within the Kuparuk River formation. The formation is subdivided into four members designated by letters, with A the oldest and D the youngest.

The Kuparuk River formation is the main producing reservoir in the Kuparuk River unit, adjacent to the Placer unit.

The Placer unit is located about six miles southwest of a developed, Kuparuk C sandstone accumulation known as Palm.

In addition to the Palm development, which came on production in 2002, a number of other discovered, isolated, local accumulations of thin Kuparuk C sand have been developed in recent years in the area surrounding Placer, the state's unit decision says. For example, about 10 to 13 miles west of Placer, both the Fiord-Kuparuk and Nanuq-Kuparuk pools within the Colville River unit came on production in 2006, and about nine miles north of Placer the Ooguruk-Kuparuk pool came on production in 2008.

The area encompassing the discovered Placer accumulation is covered by a 3-D seismic survey ARCO Alaska, which became part of ConocoPhillips, shot in 1997.

ConocoPhillips drilled the Placer No. 1 and Placer No. 2 exploration wells in 2004 as work commitments for expansion of the Kuparuk River unit following the discovery and successful development of Palm.

BP, Unocal, ChevronTexaco, ExxonMobil and ConocoPhillips were the original partners in the Placer area. ASRC farmed into BP's acreage, assuming a portion of the well cost in exchange for a 35 percent working interest in the project.

The Placer No. 1 well was spud in February 2004 and sus-

pending in March of that year after reaching a total depth of 7,761 feet. About 17 feet of hydrocarbon-bearing sands were encountered within the Kuparuk formation.

The Placer No. 2 well was drilled to delineate the Kuparuk C at a bottom hole location about 1.5 miles northeast of the Placer No. 1 bottom hole location. The Placer No. 2 well was plugged and abandoned.

"Although no production test was attempted at the time the Placer #1 well was drilled, the well bore was suspended rather than plugged and abandoned to preserve the ability to test the well at a later date," the state's Placer unit decision says. "Ultimately, after drilling the Placer #2 well, the partnership decided, without testing, that the reservoir discovered in Placer #1 was not economic to develop and the leases were subsequently dropped."

ASRC Exploration reacquired the leases in a 2006 lease sale, and later secured ownership of the Placer No. 1 wellbore from ConocoPhillips.

The new unit takes in the Placer No. 1 well, but not Placer No. 2, which failed to find a producible reservoir.

"The Placer #1 well demonstrated that decent quality oil is present in a thin, but high quality reservoir in the Placer area," the unit decision says.

ASRC Exploration made a number of work commitments to the state under a two-year plan of exploration.

The company has until Dec. 31 to reprocess and reinterpret newly licensed seismic data shot across the unit acreage. By June 30, 2013, the company must drill and log a new exploratory well, or re-enter and test the Placer No. 1 well.

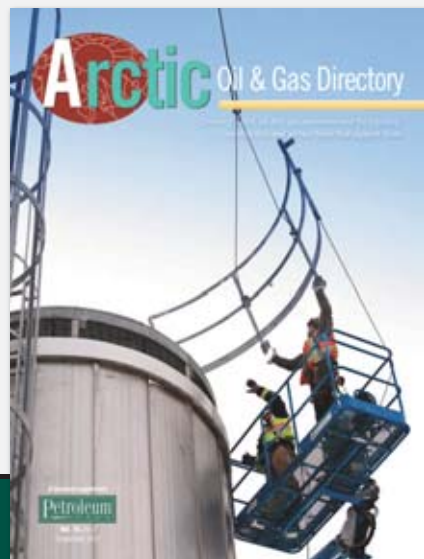
If ASRC Exploration fails to either drill the new well or re-enter the Placer No. 1, the Placer unit will automatically terminate, the unit decision says.

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
